2013 Family Days

The 13th Annual Family Days sponsored by the Cambria County Conservation District was held on July 17th and 18th at Disaster's Edge in the 1889 Park, St. Michael, PA. While those two days were two of the hottest this summer, we didn't let the heat keep us from having a great time! This year we hosted 262 people at our Family Days event. We want to thank our wonderful presenters and all of the children, parents, grandparents, and everyone in between. All of you helped to make this year another great success. We appreciate the time you took to give us your feedback. We received so many wonderful ideas and suggestions and we can't wait to start planning next year's event!

Day One

"Thank you! We had a wonderful and educational day!

Ag Lab: The Mobile Ag Lab traveled to Family Days to teach everyone about the importance of agriculture. On the first day, the Ag Lab team educated children and adults on the soybean, or "the colorful bean." First, everyone learned about soybeans and how they are used to make many products we use daily. Next, all the students performed a scientific experiment to see whether the petroleum or soy based crayon performed better. After the results were in, most people agreed that the soy based crayon was the best. Everyone went home with a homemade soybean crayon!





AMD Mysteries: Melissa Reckner from the Kiski-Conemaugh Stream Team joined us to talk about the negative effects of Acid Mine Drainage on our environment. Reckner told us that the iron oxide, which comes from mining discharge, is bad for aquatic life and habitat—it coats the gills of fish and their food sources. She also told us that resource recovery efforts are finding ways to remove the iron oxide from water sources and use it to make make-up, dyes, paint, etc. Children used the iron oxide to create awesome tie-dyed shirts and bandanas!

Tales from the Mine: Volunteers, Barb & Barry Boring, led an informative session on the history of coal mining in our area. After a short film, which highlighted the dangers and manual labors of coal mining, Barry shared stories of his personal experiences with coal mining. One particular tale of a sneaky, cookie stealing rat had everyone giggling. Barb sang a beautiful song she had written about being a coal miner's wife. And everyone created a drawing with pieces of coal.





Shaver's Creek: Live animals are always a hit at Family Days. This year was no exception as we welcomed Shaver's Creek and their "Owls Around Us" program for our special session. We were able to see a Barred Owl, a Barn Owl, and a Great Horned Owl. Shaver's Creek also brought a Red Tailed Hawk to show us the difference between the birds of prey. We learned that the color of an owl's eyes can tell us if the bird hunts for food during the day or night and how their light feathers make it possible for owls to have nearly silent flight!



Cambria County Recycles

On Tuesday, June 25, 2013 a celebratory presentation was held at the Coca-Cola Ebensburg Distribution Center. The event was held to mark the delivery of 25 recycling bins to the Cambria County Solid Waste Authority (CCSWA) from The Coca-Cola Foundation and Keep America Beautiful.



PA Wildlife Journal



In School Programs—\$2.00/person
Programs at Disaster's Edge—\$1.00/person

The District offers Environmental Education programs for area Schools, Scouts Troops, and Clubs at a minimal cost. Programs can be brought to you or you can come to our Environmental Education Center in St. Michael. Here is a sampling of the education curriculum currently being offered.

Who's Clues – Students will learn to use their senses to explore the outdoors by listening and looking for clues (tracks, scat, nests, and burrows) that the animals leave behind. (Edge)

4.3 Environmental Health; 4.6 Ecosystems and their Interactions; 4.7 Threatened, Endangered and Extinct Species; 4.8 Humans & the Environment.

Amphibians & Reptiles – Students will be introduced to the life cycle of local amphibians and reptiles; and learn how they survive the long cold winters in Pennsylvania. Live animals are featured. (Edge or Classroom)

4.1 Watersheds & Wetlands; 4.3 Environmental Health; 4.5 Integrated Pest Management; 4.6 Ecosystems and their Interactions; 4.7 Threatened, Endangered and Extinct Species.

Wetland Ecology—Students tour a local wetland as they learn about the characteristics and function of wetlands and the important role they play for wildlife and humans. (Edge)

Birds of a Feather— We'll investigate bird habitats, adaptations, and the mysteries of migration. (Edge or in classroom).

Go Green with Trees—Students learn the effects of trees on the ecosystem, learn how to identify tree species, and determine the stage of succession of a woodland or forest. (Edge).

Seeds & Frogs—Students investigate the life cycles of plants and animals, recycle a plastic bottle to create a miniature terrarium, and observe the various stages of tadpole development (Edge or Classroom)

Dirt...you got to Dig It—Students learn the secrets of soil composition, percolation and the effects these qualities play on the local ecosystem. (Edge or outdoor classroom area at school).

Day Two

"So Cool! Thank you for two days of fun!"

Ag Lab: The Ag Lab was back again, this time with a few questions about where the fruit we eat comes from. After participating in a question and answer session, everyone learned that fruits come from flowers and are able to grow thanks to the pollination done by bees! The campers made a bookmark with a 3-D flower on it. Before saying good-bye to the Ag Lab, everyone played a fun game where the campers and adults transformed into bees and a field of flowers. The bees flew from flower to flower, pollinating as they went.





Rodent Round-Up: Because the mobile mini-golf unit was such a hit last year, we brought it back! The Penn State Department of Agriculture loaned us the unique educational tool, which taught our mini-golfers all about rodents. While these critters might look cute, you don't want them running around your house. As the golfers moved from hole-to-hole, each person learned about why rodents are unwanted pests, how rodents can be controlled, and how to safely use the different methods of control. When they weren't golfing, the children headed over to Disaster's Edge to see and learn about our live critters—birds, gerbils, turtles, and even a snake!

Can You Dig It?: In this new addition to Family Days, our campers met Paula Zitzler, an archaeologist from Penn State. Paula taught us that being an archaeologist is a lot like being a detective. Archaeologists solve the mysteries of our past by discovering clues and studying artifacts. Paula shared some of her special artifacts with our campers and together they became archaeologists for a day and studied the clues to figure out what the items were, when they were made, how they were used, and what they could tell us about the people who used them.





Animal Tracks: Our final program of Family Days had many kids (and adults) squealing! Chenoa, owner of Animal Tracks, brought some of her most prized pets to share with our group. Some lucky, not to mention brave, volunteers were able to touch and hold some of them, including the Ball Python, her Bearded Dragon, a Walking Stick Bug, and a pair of Madagascar Hissing Cockroaches! Chenoa gave detailed explanations about all of her pets and she walked around with each of them so everyone could get a look up close!

Cambria County Senior Environment Corps



Are you 55 years or older, live in Cambria County and want to become involved in protecting our resources and educating the public on the natural world? If so, the new Cambria County Senior Environment Corps wants you.

The Cambria County Conservation District and Nature Abounds, a national non-profit and organizer of the Senior Environment Corps, are working together to get the new group up and running. Members can participate in a variety of tasks from monitoring water-quality, observing and reporting on wildlife, and even helping with office tasks. The possibilities are endless.

According to Nature Abounds President, Melinda Hughes-Wert, "We're thrilled that Cambria County will have a new Senior Environment Corps (SEC). There has been SEC groups in surrounding counties for quite some time – Indiana, Blair, and Clearfield - so it's time for Cambria to have one too."

Hughes-Wert continued, "Senior Environment Corps members have monitored water quality, helped to inventory wildlife, marked abandoned oil wells and educated the next generation of environmental stewards. Since 1997, SEC volunteers in Pennsylvania have contributed over 2,000,000 hours to the Commonwealth's environment, and that contribution is estimated to be valued at over \$3,000,000 a year. In 2013, the SEC program won a Western Pennsylvania Environmental Award."

Robb Piper, Manager of the Cambria County Conservation District said, "The Board of Directors is looking forward to engaging new senior resources for conservation in Cambria County."

The first project of the new Cambria County Senior Environment Corps will be water quality monitoring. The training for the project will take place on September 24th, and will last approximately five hours.
