Trout in the Classroom

On Friday, April 5, 2013 Bryan Rabish, Conservation District Watershed Specialist, and Nathan Marsh, AmeriCorps, joined Ben Watt and his Penn Cambria Middle School science students for a Trout in the Classroom field day. Benn Watt, the 2012 recipient of the Conservation Educator of the Year award, works closely with his students, teaching them the value of our environment, wildlife, and water quality.

The Trout in the Classroom program starts at the beginning of the school year, with the students hatching brook trout from eggs. The students are tasked with monitoring and trouble shooting the water quality daily. Once the fish are hatched, the students raise them until the spring.

On April 5, the trout release day was held at Beaverdam Run and Clearfield Creek. Before releasing the trout, the students must perform a macroinvertebrate study on the streams. Bryan Rabish and Nathan Marsh explained that macroinvertebrates are indicators of water quality and gave the students a lesson on how to kick the water and use their nets to collect macroinvertebrates. Using a reference sheet provided by Rabish and Marsh, the students identified the macroinvertebrates they collected. Based on their findings they were able to determine that the water quality was good. Once the water quality had been tested, each student was given a trout to release into Beaverdam Run.
