Equine Management

The Conservation District hosted a free Equine Management Workshop on Tuesday, February 19, 2013 at the Disaster's Edge educational facility in St. Michael, PA. The 17 people in attendance gathered valuable information from our expert speakers related to manure management, equine health issues, effective pasture management, erosion & sedimentation control, and signs of quality hay.



Louis Kopczyk, P.E., County Engineer, gave an overview of the revised PA Manure Management requirements. Written Manure Management Plans are required for operations that generate and/or spread manure, have a pasture, and/or have an animal concentration area. While plans can be developed by individuals, they must follow a format approved by the PA Dept. of Environmental Protection. Kopczyk explained that all

plans must be written, include a map, and should be kept on site. Plans do not require submission or approval. Assistance with preparing your plan is available through the Conservation District.

Kopczyk also reviewed Ch. 102 Agriculture Erosion & Sedimentation (E&S) Controls. E&S Pollution Control regulations require that accelerated erosion and resulting sediment must be minimized. The regulations require that a written plan explaining how accelerated erosion will be minimized must be in place if there is more than 5,000 square feet of earth disturbance. Louis briefly listed the revisions to Ch. 102 regulations. Assistance in preparing an E&S plan is available through the Conservation District.

Elizabeth Santini, DVM, PDA Veterinary Medical Field Officer, delivered an informative presentation on Equine Health Issues. Dr. Santini listed the criteria that can make a disease reportable: the disease has a significant impact on animal, plant, and/or human health; the disease has a significant economic impact; and the disease mimics known Dangerous Transmissible Diseases and Foreign Animal Diseases. Dr. Santini explained that reportable diseases vary by state and regulatory agencies take action only when a reportable disease is diagnosed or suspected. She then went on to talk about various diseases, quarantine, bio-security, and carcass composting. Finally, Dr. Santini informed everyone that most equine health issues can be handled by your veterinarian.

Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp

Applications are now being accepted for the 19th annual Rivers Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp being held June 16-21, 2013 at the Allenberry Resort in Boiling Springs, Cumberland County. The PA Council of Trout Unlimited created the camp with the purpose of educating students in the importance of cold-water conservation.

The classes include principles of ecology, geology, aquatic vertebrate and invertebrate sampling, riparian buffers, hydrology, trout behavior, trout stream entomology, the biology of pollution and the politics of conservation. Hands-on classes in fly tying, fly casting, streamside ethics, water safety and survival, and streamside botany. The students will also participate in a watershed project to repair stream habitat. Plenty of time is set aside for the students to fish the world famous Yellow Breeches Creek.

Faculty includes professionals from various agencies such as the Pennsylvania Fish & Boat Commission, the Department of Environmental Protection and the Department of Conservation and Natural Resources. Dr. Robert Behnke of Colorado State University considered the foremost trout biologist in the world is expected as the keynote speaker.

The camp is limited to 32, aged 14 to 17 so interested applicants should apply as soon as possible. The student must have been born between June 21, 1995 and June 16, 1999 to qualify. A camp selection committee will choose students based upon the required essay. The cost is \$350. Tuition assistance is available for qualified students.



Equine Management, Cont'd

JB Harrold, USDA NRCS Grazing Specialist, talked about the importance of using fencing, water systems, grazing plans, and pasture layout in order to promote efficient pasture management. Using fences and water systems in a well-designed layout can result in good use of the grazing pasture, more productivity from animals, and more efficiency. Harrold brought examples of fencing materials and used diagrams to give the workshop attendees an accurate picture of good pasture management.



Rob Stout, Agronomist from the USDA ARS Penn State Pasture Lab, wrapped up the workshop with a brief discussion on Quality Hay. Specifically, Stout gave workshop attendees helpful tips on identifying quality hay. When looking at a bale of hay, you'll want to determine the stage of maturity, see if there is any leafiness present, look for the existence of foreign materials, observe its condition and odor, and check for the greenness and color of the hay.

Where is Disaster's Edge Environmental Education Center?

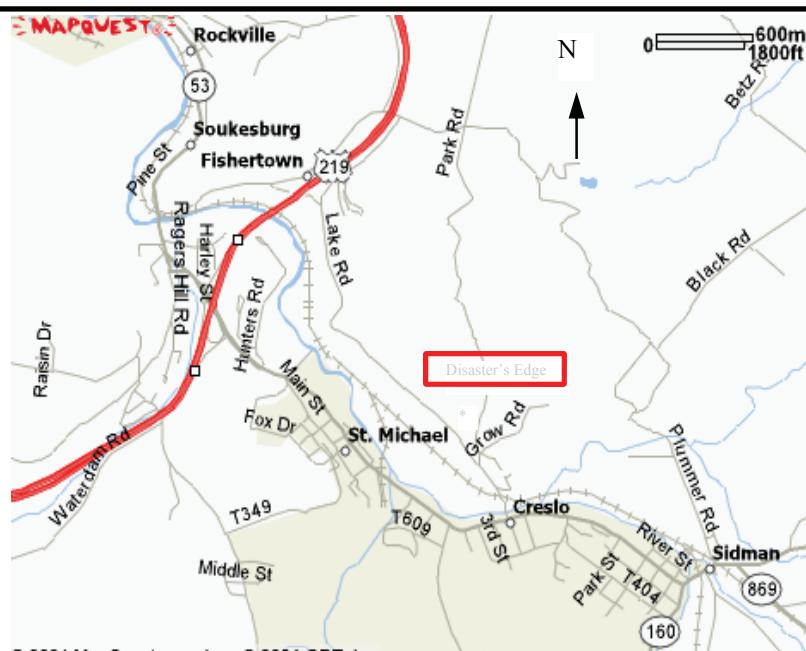
