Fall Educational Programs

We kicked off the new school year with a fantastic program at our educational facility, Disaster's Edge. Jackie Ritko, CCCD Resource Supervisor and Education Coordinator for Disaster's Edge, organizes fun-filled, information-rich, interest-peaking days for students of local school districts. Using the natural resources located in and around the Edge, students learn about our environment, conservation methods, and local history.

On September 29 and 30, Disaster's Edge welcomed its first group of students for the 2011-2012 school year. Six 4<sup>th</sup> grade classes took a field trip to the Edge to learn about pumpkins, tree identification, and the history of coal mining in our area. The students enjoyed a picnic lunch in the park's pavilion. The two days definitely had the feel of crisp, fall weather, but luckily the rain stayed away!

Mary Ellen (Ellie) Bard, CCCD Administrative Assistant, and Jocelyn Sauter, AmeriCorps, taught the students that there is more to pumpkins than carving them for Halloween. The students identified and labeled the parts of a pumpkin during the anatomy lesson. Ellie explained how DNA determines the size and color of pumpkins. Using simple measurements, each group of students calculated the weight of their pumpkins and then compared their calculations to the actual weight - some groups had spot-on calculations! Finally, after a brief lesson on pollination, students worked together to empty their pumpkins and count the seeds. They found that the biggest pumpkin didn't always have the most seeds. Each student was sent home with a bag of pumpkin seeds and a recipe to roast them with his or her family. Thank you to Benshoff Farms and Pisarski Farms for the



generous donations of pumpkins!

Jackie Ritko and Bryan Rabish, CCCD Watershed Specialist, opened up the Coal Miner's Museum to the students. The museum features a realistic replica of a mine shaft. Using the exhibits and pictures, donated by members of the community, Jackie and Bryan taught the students about local coal mining history, the way a mine is constructed, the different tools and their uses in mining, and how coal is formed, extracted, and used. Many of the children thought it would be "awesome" to work in a coal mine instead of going to school. However, when they discovered how harsh the conditions were, they quickly retracted that sentiment! Did you know the Child Labor Laws in force today were formed in large part due to the child labor conditions of the mines in our area? With the remaining time students were able to explore the museum. (cont. p 6)

# Fall Workshops



Mary Ellen Bard, Conservation District Administrative Assistant, organized two free workshops this Fall for more than 80 people. Tom Ford, a horticulturalist from the Cambria County Cooperative Extension Office, was the expert speaker for both workshops. On September 29 an informative session about the Brown Marmorated Stinkbug (BMS) was held. During this workshop, attendees learned how the BMS came to exist in our area, which plants and objects attract the pest (did you know light-colored houses attract the BMS), and about possible eradication methods (chemical solutions, natural predators, safe disposal, etc). The information delivered by Tom Ford was especially pertinent to local farmers; the BMS can have very damaging effects on many crops. Homeowners picked up useful tips on how to keep the nuisance pest out of their house and what to do if they already have an infestation.

On October 12, the second fall workshop was held. The Orchard and Landscape Management session was widely attended and very educational. The purpose of this workshop was to provide attendees with information on what they can do today to prevent



a problem with their trees, plants, and lawns in the Spring. Too often, people wait until they see signs of an issue to apply treatment – by then it's usually too late. Ford talked about the importance of managing weeds and rodents to combat disease, assessing tree vigor and looking for injury, utilizing proper pruning



techniques and optimal timing, and performing tests to save time and money when putting in a new lawn. Eighty percent of tree mortality is the result of humans' lack of proper care. Hopefully, that number will shrink as people implement the strategies delivered by Tom Ford.

## 2012 Poster Contest Rules



Any media may be used to create a flat or two-dimensional effect (paint, crayon, colored pencil, charcoal, stickers, paper or other materials on regular posters). (No computer category this year)

Poster size must be between 8.5" x 11" and 22" x 28" (or as rules at your local or state level)

All posters entered must have the entry form completed and attached to the back of the poster. (Local winners will be asked to complete an additional entry form in order to send the poster on to the state competition.)

Posters should be packaged so they remain flat when sent for judging.

- All posters must be created by an individual student rather than a team of students.
- The 2012 title "Soil to Spoon!" must be on your poster. (Don't use any other title.)
- Although younger students will most likely receive help in planning from parents or teachers, NACD encourages
  each student to do as much of the work as possible by him/herself. Entries completed by students in their handwriting and coloring will score better than those designed, drawn and colored by adult assistance.
- Posters must be submitted to the Cambria County Conservation District office by April 16, 2012

# Disaster's Edge Spring Programs

"The Best field trip EVER!" In School Programs—\$1.00/person Programs at Disaster's Edge—\$.50/person "A wonderful experience for our students."

Environmental Education programs are for area schools, scout troops, and clubs. Programs can be brought to you or you can come to The Edge in St. Michael. Here are some of the programs being offered for the Spring of 2012:

**Who's Clues** – Students will learn to use their senses to explore the outdoors by listening and looking for clues (tracks, scat, nests, and burrows) that the animals leave behind. (Edge)

4.3 Environmental Health; 4.6 Ecosystems and their Interactions; 4.7 Threatened, Endangered and Extinct Species; 4.8 Humans & the Environment.

**Amphibians & Reptiles** – Students will be introduced to the life cycle of local amphibians and reptiles; and learn how they survive the long cold winters in Pennsylvania. Live animals are featured. (Edge or Classroom)

4.1 Watersheds & Wetlands; 4.3 Environmental Health; 4.5 Integrated Pest Management; 4.6 Ecosystems and their Interactions; 4.7 Threatened, Endangered and Extinct Species.

**Wetland Ecology**—Students tour a local wetland as they learn about the characteristics and function of wetlands and the important role they play for wildlife and humans. (Edge)

4.1 Watersheds & Wetlands; 4.2 Renewable and nonrenewable Resources; 4.3 Environmental Health; 4.6 Ecosystems and their Interactions

**Birds of a Feather**– We'll investigate bird habitats, adaptations, and the mysteries of migration. (Edge or in classroom).

**Go Green with Trees**—Students learn the effects of trees on the ecosystem, test for levels of chlorophyll using Chromatography, learn how to identify tree species, and determine the stage of succession of a woodland or forest. (Edge).

4.2 Renewable and nonrenewable Resources; 4.3 Environmental Health; 4.4 Agriculture and Society; 4.6 Ecosystems and their Interactions; 4.7 Threatened, Endangered and Extinct Species; 4.8 Humans and the Environment.

**Seeds & Frogs**—Students investigate the life cycles of plants and animals, recycle a plastic bottle to create a miniature terrarium, and observe the various stages of tadpole development (Edge or Classroom)

**Dirt...you got to Dig It**—Students learn the secrets of soil composition, percolation and the effects these qualities play on the local ecosystem. (Edge or outdoor classroom area at school).

Nathan Marsh, AmeriCorps, led the students in a tree identification lesson. Nathan started the session in the park pavilion with a demonstration using leaves gathered from the surrounding trees. The students were shown that leaves have different growth patterns, and by identifying these growth patterns one can identify the species of tree to which the leaves belong. Students were split into groups, and using a worksheet designed by Nathan, each group participated in a tree identification scavenger hunt. They navigated their way around the Edge with the aid of a map. When they found a tree with a pink ribbon, the students consulted the questions on their sheets. As they answered each question, they grew closer to discovering the species of each tree. Everyone was very proud when he or she was able to declare, "It's a White Ash!"

# Envirothon 2012



Young minds thrive on challenges. The Envirothon is a program designed to cultivate a desire to learn more about our natural environment through competitive events. For over 20 years, high schools in PA have been recognizing the value of the Envirothon experience. Students and their teachers become empowered by their own motivation as the Envirothon engages them in an exciting, multi-faceted study of the environment. For many people involved, the Envirothon is more than just a competition. Participating students often pursue further education in environmental fields. Many Envirothon participants pursuing college degrees in various natural resource studies have indicated that their education choice was partly due, or strengthened by, their

Envirothon experience. Envirothon advisors credit the Envirothon with increasing student interest and involvement in environmental sciences.

# South Fork AMD Remediation Project

The South Fork Abandoned Mine Drainage (AMD) Remediation Project is a collaborative effort of several partners, property owners, state and federal agencies and non-profit organizations. The project focuses on a 4-mile stretch of the Little Conemaugh River from the Lloydale Dam to Beaverdale. The goal of the project is to raise water quality, improve native brook trout fishery, and increase the recreational opportunities of the region.



Aside from the Growing Greener Grant, sources of funding and resources came from the Eastern Brook Trout Venture through the US Fish and Wildlife Service (\$46,000), U.S. Office of Surface Mining through the Southern Alleghenies Conservancy (\$30,000), PA Fish and Boat Commission's installation of fish habitat structures, PACD Somerset Technical Assistance Program's provision of engineering and design, Hedin Environmental's development of treatment priorities and conceptual recommendations, and Nick Deitle's (a local Forest Hills High School student) design and construction of the watershed signs.

The Conservation District hosted a site dedication on October 19, 2011. We were joined by members of the LCWA, DR&GC, and



Beaverdale Conservation Group. Jim Penna, Chief of Staff for Congressman Critz, was also in attendance. Jackie Ritko, CCCD Resource Supervisor, and Malcom Crittenden, DEP, spoke about the project and its history and led the group in a tour of the treated areas.

The Remediation Project was started in 2006 when Joel Kosmac, a local volunteer with the Little Conemaugh Watershed Association (LCWA), started monitoring AMD discharges in the headwaters of the river. In 2007 the DEP Watershed Manager became interested and started working with the LCWA, the Cambria County Conservation District (CCCD), and the Dunlo Rod and Gun Club (DR&GC). CCCD and LCWA received a Growing Greener Grant (\$105,000) to construct several limestone beds and trenches to reduce aluminum in the stream and raise pH levels. The DR&GC received funding for limestone sand dosing.
